Guiding Patients and Families Through Transitions in Care

Our second annual Palliative Care Symposium begins at 9:30 AM on Friday, October 25th. Participants will be guided through a half-day training comprised of didactic presentation, teaching and demonstration of communication skills, and facilitated small group interactive sessions.

Areas addressed will include the impact of clear communication on patient/family outcomes, identification and response to emotion in clinical encounters, and successfully assisting patients in identifying appropriate goals in changing clinical circumstances. Regional data on end of life measures will be reviewed. Small and large group exercises will include communication skills to manage emotion in clinical encounters and the determinants of "difficult" communication. Self-care in a challenging profession will also be addressed.

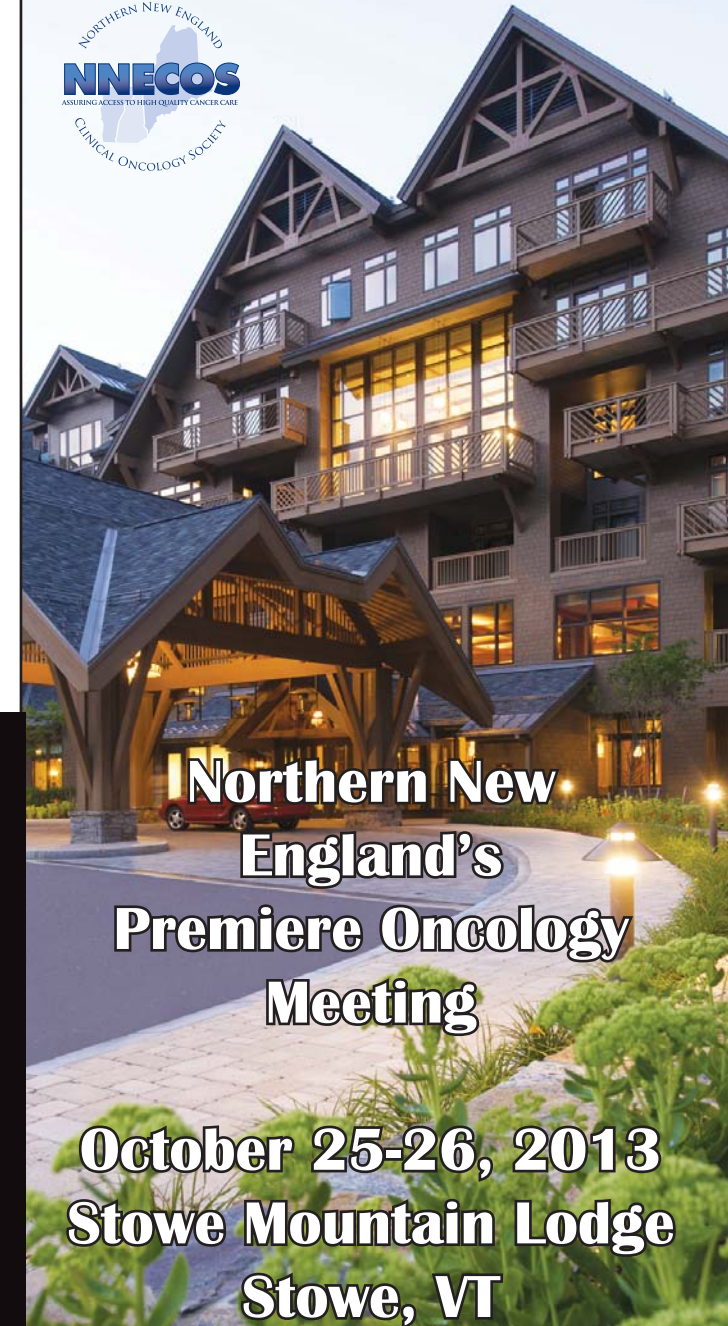

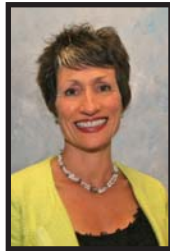

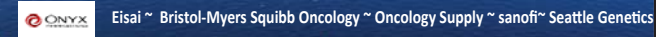

Educational Objectives

After attending the conference, participants should be able to:

- Apply advances in scientific and translational research in the care of their patients;

- Develop and implement strategies to improve communication within practices to enhance patient care;
